Development Report

SUBJECT: An overview report from the Program Manager of Instructional and Community Development of the Office of College, Career & Technical Education to the Career Technical Education Advisory Committee for the period of October 4, 2012 to December 4, 2012.

ITEMS: Instructional Development

- CCTEU: Flipped Learning/The Blended Classroom, 4 October. Lance Larson launched the CCTE University professional development opportunity to 48 core subject and CTE teachers from throughout the district in the auto-torium at Madison High School.
- Business & Community Relations Associates (BCRA). BCRA Lori Williams and BCRA Clint McVay introduced Outlook Business Contact Manager to the BCRA team after making substantial 'CCTE customizations' to the program. The BCRAs are now using this project management tool to improve the effectiveness of our customer service efforts on behalf of our industry partners and our CCTE teachers.
- Designated Subjects Credential. The Division of Extended Learning at National University has agreed to partner with CCTE to recommend applicants of the Designated Subjects credential to the California Commission on Teacher Credentialing and to give CCTE the responsibility of providing the university-level coursework for teachers to complete the credential renewal requirements.
- San Diego State University (SDSU) Linked Learning Teacher Education Program. As a follow-up for the 11 SDSU student teachers who participated in the 2012 PBL Summer Institute and as an opportunity to increase the visibility of CCTE in the SDSU School of Education, Ralph was a guest presenter during a regularly scheduled class. Early reports indicate he only set back CCTE by about three years.

ITEMS: Community Development

- Advanced Course Reviews, September through November. Under the leadership of the CCTE BCRAs, more than 150 industry professionals have helped review the course outlines of 53 Advanced courses. Program Specialists will follow-up with professional development for the CTE teachers.
- National Defense Industrial Association (NDIA) Luncheon, 17 October. At the invitation of CTEAC member Terry McKearney, and on behalf of the NDIA Education Committee, Ralph asked engineers to help CCTE do what engineers do best: solve a problem. For this particular request, to help solve the problem of providing internships, job shadow opportunities, and mentors for the students enrolled in the Project Lead the Way courses.
