ESEA Law – under ESSA

- Private School Participation is cited in ESEA Law, as amended by ESSA, at:
- •Title I, Part A, Subpart 1, Section 1117 – Participation of children enrolled in private schools

• Title VIII, Part F, Subpart 1, Section 8501-8506 - Private Schools



Equitable Programs under ESSA

- **Title I, Part A** Improving the Academic Achievement of the Disadvantaged
- Title I, Part C Education of Migrant Children
- **Title II, Part A** Preparing & Training High Quality Teachers, Principals & Other School Leaders (Supporting Effective Instruction)
- Title III, Part A –Language Instruction for English Learners & Immigrant Students
- Title IV, Part A 21st Century Schools: Student Support & Academic Enrichment Grants
- **Title IV, Part B** –21st Century Community Learning Centers



District Requirements of Equitable Participation Under ESSA

- Non-profit private and non-public schools must be invited to participate in the equitable services program
- Provision of Services Private schools receive equitable services based on an allocation, not actual dollars



District Requirements of Equitable Participation Under ESSA (continued)

- District is held accountable for providing equitable services to private schools
- Equitable participation is monitored and enforced through the Ombudsman housed at CDE
- The Private Schools Program is reviewed by CDE during Federal Program Monitoring (FPM)



Process to Determine Proportion of Private School Funding

- District is allowed to select the source and method of low-income data collected from private schools
- Only low-income, SDUSD students, enrolled at the private school (Grades K-12), and meeting the Federal Income Criteria for Free or Reduced Lunch, are eligible



Process to Determine Proportion of Private School Funding (continued)

- Private schools submit low-income data for students enrolled at the private school.
- The District verifies the data and determines the total number of low-income private school students eligible for funding
- The total number of low-income **public school students** is added to the total number of low-income **private school students** for total low-income students



Process to Determine Proportion of Private School Funding (continued) The % of private school students to the total number of low-income students (public + private) is how the private school proportion is calculated

- The proportion of the private schools' Title I funds are taken from the District's total Title I allocation
- Administrative costs for private school services are taken from the private school's proportion

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District Provides Title | Services

Only Title I identified & eligible (SDUSD) **students** are provided services (targeted assistance). The private school does NOT receive services.
