

I think more emphasis should be placed on making school an environment of opportunity. Show students early on options outside of just college. Allow them to explore trades and other important roles in society and give them the access to the tools/resources to get them there. While college attendance is important, it is not the only measurement of student success. I would also recommend making attending college a goal that seems more attainable for students that wish to attend by providing more information at an earlier age of what it takes to be prepared for college. I would not limit information to only junior and seniors- have kids thinking college-bound thoughts in elementary and give them a REAL hope of attaining that goal. Create a way for students to map their success in real time (maybe an online tool) with milestones to break down this goal in bite sized pieces where by with each day of attendance they are getting closer to reaching that goal.
