California High School Proficiency Exam (CHSPE)**

Options once student has passed CHSPE:

Option 1: Work toward high school diploma

Student takes the CHSPE, passes and decides to remain in high school and pursue a regular high school diploma.

1. Student is enrolled in high school coursework for the full instructional day.
2. Student may attend college through a site partnership or through concurrent enrollment. Administrative Regulation 6172
3. If the parent/guardian wants the CHSPE results included in the student's records, the parent/guardian must submit results to the school counselor for entering into the Student Information System and placement in the transcript file.

Option 2: Dual Enrolled at High School and College

Student takes the CHSPE, passes and requests to remain in high school and enroll in college course(s)

1. Student must remain enrolled in high school coursework for a minimum of 180 minutes a day.
2. Student may attend college through a site partnership or through concurrent enrollment. Administrative Regulation 6172.
3. If the parent/guardian want the CHSPE results included in the student's records, the parent/guardian must submit results to the school counselor for entering into the Student Information System and placement in the transcript file.

Option 3: Exit High School and Attend College Full Time

Student takes the CHSPE, passes and decides to enroll in college full time and withdraw from SDUSD.

1. The student/parent/guardian must submit CHSPE results to the school counselor.

2. School counselor processes Exemption Request, and if approved by the district the site places the Exemption in the transcript file and uses the exit code 330 to record the passing of the CHSPE on the transcript.
3. The site advises student and parent/guardian of student's options and that although the CHSPE results/state-issued certificate of proficiency is equivalent to a high school diploma, some colleges may not accept it for admission.
4. Student separates from high school and enrolls in college.
