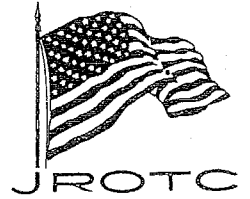

Desired Learning Outcomes:

- Appreciation of the ethical values and principles that underlie good citizenship, including integrity, responsibility, and respect for constituted authority.
- Development of leadership potential with the abilities to live and work cooperatively with others.
- Ability to think logically and to communicate effectively, both orally and in writing.
- Appreciation of the importance of physical fitness in maintaining good health.
- Knowledge of the effects and dangers of substance abuse, ways to resist pressure to try drugs and how to help others to avoid them.
- Development of mental management abilities including goal setting, visualization and positive self talk.
- Familiarities with the history, purpose, and structure of the military services with emphasis on the accomplishments of the United States Army.

Textbooks and Uniforms: All textbooks and uniforms are provided by the U.S. Army at no cost to the student (cadet). However, the cadet is expected to properly maintain all items issued and is required to pay for each item lost or damaged. **Students who drop, transfer, or leave JROTC must turn in all uniforms and materials issued.**

Instructional activities and Procedures: The typical day would consist of a period of academic study (normally Wednesday and Thursday), in which the cadet would need a pen/pencil, textbooks, and notebooks, and a period of leadership training that may involve drill, inspections, and applied leadership exercises. Monday and Friday classes will normally be used for physical education and organized sports. Cadets are required every week to wear the Army JROTC uniform for inspection and throughout the designated uniform day normally Tuesday unless excused by one of the Army Instructors. In addition to activities on campus, field trips are planned during the school years.

Requirements: In order for a cadet to remain in the Army JROTC he/she must:

- Be physically fit to participate in the physical education program
- Maintain the required grooming standards for wearing the AJROTC uniform
- Bring a notebook, paper, and pen/pencil on Wednesday and Thursday
- Maintain satisfactory academic grades with normal progress toward a diploma
- Maintain satisfactory citizenship grades

Student Evaluation: Grades given to JROTC students have direct bearing on the cadets' total credit toward graduation and their eligibility for promotion. Each unit will use the standard system listed below. The grades given a student at the end of each marking period will be determine by:

- The performance of the cadet during classroom work to include spot quizzes and examination. (15%)
- The performance of the cadet during physical training and the scores obtained on the Cadet challenge tests. (10%)
- The performance of the cadet during inspections, drill, and extra-curricular activities. (50%)
- Demonstrated leadership. (25%)

Homework Policy: Cadets will be given outside-of-class assignments. These assignments will count towards the final grade in the class. Assignments must be turned in on time. Exceptions to this are prior coordination with the instructor, or an excused absence on the day of collection. Cadets returning from an absence have one school day per absence in which to make-up missed assignments. Work cannot be made up if an absence is truancy.

Attendance: Absence from class for whatever reason can only have a harmful effect on a cadet's progress and grades. Furthermore, punctuality is a trait worthy of development in every cadet for good citizenship.

Citizenship: Citizenship grades will be based on several factors, including:

- Classroom behavior
- Cooperation with other cadets and the instructors
- Attendance (truancies, tardies, and absences)
- The way in which class responsibilities and obligations are carried out
- Cadet participation

Academic and Citizenship Standards: Cadets must maintain satisfactory academic (2.0 or higher) and citizenship (S or higher) grades to be eligible to participate in any extra-curricular cadet activity. This includes field trips, all drill teams, color guard, awards and promotions. The Certification of Completion for Army JROTC is based upon satisfactory completion of the required Leadership Education and Training Courses. Satisfactory or better grades in both academics and citizenship for every course are necessary to receive the Certificate of Completion.
